Things to note:

You may need to apply for a state electrical permit. Your electrician will usually handle that for you, but make sure that you communicate with them about it, if one is required. It is an online application process through the state.

Right of way. There may be additional paperwork that needs to be signed for the right of way for your build.

Paperwork can be signed and mailed in, or you can come to our office and sign. We have notaries available.

Contract paperwork will arrive in two sets. The paperwork is identical. Once complete, both HPP and the customer will have an original copy for their records.

Once paperwork is signed and your contribution is paid, your build goes into the queue for the crews to work on.

THINGS TO THINK ABOUT FOR A NEW SERVICE

In our last edition, we talked about how landscaping can effect safety and about the Call Before You Dig program. When you get ready to do a new build, consider some of these suggestions. As you plan your landscaping and home layout, think about whether your electric infrastructure is going to be overhead, or underground. Think about where those lines will go and how you want your landscape to look. Don't plant trees where the roots will interfere with the lines overhead or underground. Don't run the lines under a place where you want to build a patio. If you think you might add buildings later, think about where those will go in relation to the lines you are putting in now. **Plan for the future!**
