

As Spring looms on the horizon, we at High Here are a few tip

Plains Power want to emphasize safety when it comes to trees and powerlines. Tree limbs growing into the lines creates a fire hazard.

Wet spring conditions can cause trees to be conductors, which increases the hazards. We discourage members from doing their own trimming under the power lines. Trees or tree limbs can fall in the wrong direction or fall into the lines and damage power infrastructure or injure anyone on the ground. Best practice is to notify us that branches are in or close to the lines and having our trained tree trimmers address the issue.

Our crews and tree trimmers patrol our service area and track areas that need attention. If you notice that tree branches are interfering with the power lines on your property, we encourage you to give us a call so we can get you on our schedule! Here are a few tips that will help you with future landscaping projects:

Look up before you plant! If there are power lines, don't plant anything that grows to that height.

Be aware that trees with medium or moderate growth will add 13-24" of height per year.

Call 811 before you dig! Know where your utilities are so you don't hit lines when you begin your landscape project.

Look down before you dig! Be aware of underground powerlines and whether or not root systems will grow into them and disrupt your power.


